MANUSCRIPT BY YOUNG BUFFALO POET WINS STEVENS COMPETITION

Winner of the Stevens Poetry Manuscript Competition is *Come In*, *We're Open*, by Sara Ries of Buffalo, New York. She has been awarded

\$1,000, and her manuscript will be published by the NFSPS Press this spring. It will be her first book. Ries' manuscript also won the Best Thesis in Poetry award at Chatham University, where she received her M.F.A. The poems in *Come In, We're Open* are centered around a diner in a workingclass Buffalo neighborhood and are full of vividly evoked characters - those of the speaker's parents, who own the diner, and of the regulars who



patronize it. Ries' parents have owned a diner in Buffalo since she was two years old, and she continues to work in diners, currently hosting Poetry and Dinner Nights at the Woodlawn Diner. Ries' manuscript was chosen from among 185 submissions from all over the U.S. and abroad. The Stevens Competition is exceptional among national poetry book manuscript competitions in that the judge undertakes to read 100 of the entries, rather than just a handful of finalists. Judge for the competition was Ralph Burns of Little Rock, author of several books of poetry, including *Ghost Notes* (2001), winner of the Field Poetry Prize, and *Swamp Candles* (1996), winner of the Iowa Poetry Prize. Burns is a professor at the University of Arkansas and former Editor of *Crazyhorse*.

In addition to the winner, Burns selected a dozen "manuscripts of merit." The 12 manuscripts of merit, listed in the order they were logged in, are as follows:

- Floating Women, by Darcy Cummings of Laurel Springs, NJ
- Algonquins Planted Salmon, by Donald Levering of Santa Fe, NM
- Lost Moon, by Holly Karapetkova of Arlington, VA

Concerning his selection of Sara Ries' Come In, We're Open as the Stevens winner, Burns comments, "In reading this collection, I found myself wondering who this poet was, what place this was where people are held so dear, where the closed steel plant, Ford plant, and amusement park represent one partner in dissipated 'marriage' with the diner, a place Chaucer's pilgrims might have never left." Reflecting on his impressions, he sums up, "This collection demands that we value differently what seems quotidian, remain curious, suspend disbelief a few moments longer...These are some stacked high pancakes, and some sweet songs from 'a coffee spiller waitress...in the cadence /of plate scrapes to relieve swollen feet'; and yes, Sara Ries celebrates 'the moments - / I wear them with long skirts, / taken by the intelligence of the breeze." Sara Ries' new book will be available for purchase at the 2010 NFSPS Convention in Memphis. She will read from it at dinner on Saturday, June 12, and will sign copies. ~ Eleanor Berry, Chairman
