Keynote speaker, Mark Turcotte, Ojibwe poet, was born April 5, 1958 and spent his earliest years on North Dakota's Turtle



Mountain Chippewa Reservation and in the migrant camps of the western United States. Later, he grew up in and around Lansing, MI. After leaving school he traveled the country,

working and living on the road for nearly fifteen years.

Arriving in Chicago in the spring of 1993, Turcotte rediscovered his love of words and writing, quickly establishing himself as a unique voice in the city's thriving poetry scene. That summer he was winner of the First Gwendolyn Brooks Open-mic Poetry Award. Soon thereafter he was selected by Ms. Brooks as a Significant Illinois Poet and was named to the Illinois Authors Poster. During the remainder of his time in Chicago he was the recipient of a Writer's Community Residency from National Writer's Voice and was awarded the 1997 Josephine Gates Kelly Memorial Fellowship from the Wordcraft Circle of Native Writers and Storytellers. He left Chicago in early 1998 to live and work in Door County, Wisconsin.

Turcotte is author of *The Feathered Heart*; Songs of Our Ancestors; a chapbook, Road Noise, and Le Chant de la Route, a bilingual selection of his work published in Paris. His latest collection, Exploding Chippewas, is in its third printing. His poetry and fiction have recently appeared in LUNA, TriQuarterly, POETRY, Prairie Schooner, Ploughshares, The Missouri Review, The Seattle Review, Rosebud, Hunger Mountain, North Dakota Quarterly, and The Laurel Review. His poem, The Flower On, was chosen by the Poetry Society of America for inclusion in their Poetry In Motion project, which places poetry placards on public transportation in cities across the United States.

Over the past years Mark has been awarded Literary Fellowships in 1999 and in 2003 by the Wisconsin Arts Board, and was honored with a 2001-2002 Lannan Foundation Completion He Literary Grant. has completed a National Book Foundation American Voices assignment at the Wind River Indian Reservation of Wyoming, and a Lannan Writer's Residency in Marfa, Texas. His work is included in the national high school poetry recitation project, Poetry OutLoud.

After serving as the 2008-09 Visiting Native Writer at the Institute of American Indian Arts in Santa Fe, New Mexico, he has returned to Chicago where he is Visiting Assistant Professor of Creative Writing at DePaul University.

Amy Kindred of Indianapolis, IN, is a painter with paintings in private and public collections across the United States and in Mexico, and a 2005 Creative Renewal Arts



Fellowship winner. Her art work was published in *UU World Magazine*. She is also a writer, theologian, and a former art teacher and arts administrator.

Her essays are included in *Indiana Authors* 2007: Twelve Writers from the Heartland and *Indiana Authors* 2007: Inspiration from the Heartland, both titles published by New Century Publishing Company. Amy has a Master of Divinity degree, a Master of Theological Studies degree with research in art and religion, was ordained, and is currently serving the First Unitarian Universalist Congregation in Terre Haute, Indiana.

Her book, *Twin Muses: Art and Poetry*, was published in 2010 and includes the poetry of several Indiana poets written about the pictures in the book. This combination of the arts is very fascinating.

Paddy Lynn: I was six years old. My first



grade class was doing a holiday program at the local high school. I walked out on stage dressed in a white tutu, carrying an enormous lollipop bigger than my head, when the lights

suddenly flashed and the sound rolled, and *Voila!* - It was Showtime! From that moment on, the acting bug bit me and there was no stopping me. To this day, I continue to dream and live my passion as actress and storyteller. Not a day goes by that I don't thank God and my lucky stars for the opportunity.

All through my elementary and high school days, I was active in plays, and fascinated with theatre in general. It was no wonder I majored in theatre in college at Illinois State University, where I received my BA.

After finishing college, I joined a theatre group in Evanston, IL, and helped form a children's theatre company that went into schools in the Chicago metropolitan area. I had such a wonderful time sharing a variety of programs with the students that I decided to return to the schools after taking a hiatus to have my second daughter. When I returned, I worked as a substitute teacher and a teacher's aide in the elementary schools. I was actually honing my skills as a storyteller at the time, without being fully aware that I would soon launch into a career as a storyteller.

David Warner Stocking was born June 28, 1944 in North Adams, Massachusetts, the

son of two English teachers, Dave didn't fall far from the tree. Recently stepping into semi-retirement, his own forty-six year career as an English teacher passed



through secondary schools and colleges in Pennsylvania, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Florid, and Indiana. He is a graduate of Bowdoin College (B.S.), Lehigh University (M.A.), and Boston University (D.Ed.). His involvement with reading and writing poetry has been a lifelong indulgence, and he currently cultivates these interests with kindred spirits in Anderson and Noblesville, Indiana. He now does tutoring and resides in Noblesville.

Marci Rae Johnson holds an MFA in Poetry Writing from Spalding University. She currently teaches at Valparaiso University where she serves as Poetry Editor



for *The Cresset* and on the English department reading series committee (Wordfest). She is also the Poetry Editor for WordFarm press. Her poems appear or are forthcoming in

The Valparaiso Poetry Review, Perihelion, The Louisville Review, Phoebe, The Christian Century, Minnetonka Review, Strange Horizons, and 32 Poems, among others. Her first collection of poetry won the 2010 Powder Horn Prize and will be published by Sage Hill Press later this year.

AIRPORT TRANSPORTATION FOR CONVENTION

The best method is by rental car. From O'Hare, directions are: East on Illinois 294 (toll road) to Indiana; to Interstate 80/94 East, in Indiana, approximately 16 miles to I-65 South toward Indianapolis. Take the Merriville Exit 253, turn right, then right again (this is a hairpin turn), and you are at the Star Plaza Radisson Hotel. From Midway, head south on Ciscero Avenue to I-294. From there directions are identical with those from O'Hare.

Coach USA is a curbside bus service to Highland, IN. NFSPS STEVENS POETRY MANUSCRIPT COMPETITION

This year's winner of the NFSPS Stevens Poetry Manuscript Competition is *Good Reason*, by Jennifer Habel of Cincinnati, Ohio. She has been awarded \$1000, and her manuscript will be published this spring by NFSPS Press. This will be Habel's first full-length book of poetry. Her earlier work has appeared in numerous journals, and her chapbook, *In the Little House*, was the winner of the



2008 Copperdome Prize. A graduate of the Writing Program at UNC Greensboro, she has taught at American University, Colorado College, Radford University, and the University of Massachusetts at Amherst. She now makes her home in Cincinnati, where she is serving as Coordinator of Fiction Writing at the University of Cincinnati.

Good Reason centers on the life of a young mother through a series of tightly wrought, emotionally restless lyrics. There is a compelling arc to the whole collection, but each lyric also stands on its own for its poignancy and freshness.

The judge for the 2011 Stevens Competition was Jessica Garratt, the award-winning author of *Fire Pond* (University of Utah Press, 2009), winner of the Agha Shahid Ali Prize in Poetry. Garratt's work has also appeared in many of the best known poetry journals, including *Shenandoah*, *The Missouri Review*, and *The Western Humanities Review*. Garratt selected Habel's *Good Reason* as the winner from almost 200 manuscripts from throughout the United States, and selected as well a handful of excellent finalists:

- Erica Dawson (Florida) for *The Small Blades Hurt*
- Ezra Feldman (New York) for *The Body As One*
- Alison Powell (New York) for *On the Desire to Levitate*
- Sarah Sousa (Massachusetts) for Church of Needles
- Philip White (Kentucky) for *Among Other Things*

Garratt spoke of the keen difficulties in deciding among the finalists, but in the end, as she said, there was only one choice:

"Once I began this collection, there was no putting it down; I read *Good Reason* greedily, and not just once. Jennifer Habel has created a compelling portrait of a life that bears the gestural quality of a sketch artist's work, coupled with the psychological pressure and expansiveness of a novelist's. The collection pursues its subject matter with refreshing urgency, exploring the conflicting internal and external realities of being human, woman, wife and mother, all at once."

Garratt goes on to discuss the strengths of the prize-winning manuscript in detail, especially its pure distillation of what she calls the "unwavering mind . . .trying to steady a palpable heart." Jennifer Habel's new book, *Good Reason*, will be available for purchase at the 2012 NFSPS Convention in Merrillville, Indiana. She is planning to be there herself, to read from the book, so you will definitely want to attend.

The governor's letter honored her for her long years of service to KSPS and for her efforts in promoting poetry in the Commonwealth. In 1991 when the *Pegasus* editor became too ill to produce the journal in a timely manner, Miriam was asked to become assistant editor so that she could produce the journal alone if necessary. She accepted, and when Paul Salyers served as KSPS president in 1992, Miriam became the full-time editor at his request. Twenty years later Miriam is still holding the reins and steering Pegasus through planning, production, and mailing, three times a year. It is Miriam who has made Pegasus fly. KSPS owes the quality of Pegasus to Miriam's standards in choosing the poetry, her attention to detail, and her insistence that the journal "look good". "Write What You Know?"
"No," says poet Mark Doty

Although I have a charming close-up photograph of me and the poet, Mark Doty, from the NFSPS Convention in 2009, when he was the keynote speaker; I'm sure Doty would not recognize me. I know I've thought about him a great deal more than he has thought about me. I have listened intently to Doty lecture about poetry on three separate occasions and read many of his poems. He is a smart, urban poet whose work has range and depth. He's self-deprecatingly funny, but has also been affected by loss, particularly the death of his long-time lover to AIDs. The most startling advice I heard from him was to embrace mystery and ignore the advice to "write what you know." For Doty, this is a prescription for predictability. He advises poets to write about what you don't know.

There are lots of things I don't know much about. I don't know about geology, apart from a lecture I heard when touring the Grand Canyon. Car engines? Not a clue. Bird migrations? Not interested. If I took Doty's advice literally, I could see myself engulfed in Google learning about any of these topics and then writing truly terrible poetry.

What I take Doty to mean when he advises writing about what I don't know, is to ask myself what calls to me, what interests me, and even what I am afraid of. He advises to take a draft of a poem and write as many questions about what is going on in the poem as I can think of. Then, decide which of those questions really have juice in them, and try to explore that question in my poem. "Questions are like trap doors or transitional devices to lead to another layer of meaning." He doesn't promise that I will find the answer to the question, but that my poem will improve by addressing it. He cited Walt Whitman's famous question posed in "Song of Myself", "And a child said to me, 'what is the grass?" This question led to beautiful poetry, including the line "And now I think it is the beautiful uncut hair of graves."

Have you thought of the perfect last line for your poem? Doty says: don't use it. If you already know where your poem is going to end, you have shut down its possibilities. At the 2009 meeting of the NFSPS, Doty advised poets to "train like an athlete to stay under water longer." Resist closing down your poem. Write the longest poem you can write before contracting it.

Doty spoke at the Dodge Festival in 2008 about his poem, "Apparition," which was inspired by seeing a peacock named Hommer at a garden center. Doty was

reminded by the peacock's name, of the poet Homer, and wrote a poem that ranged from the garden center to Greek mythology to the architecture of metal work. The poem begins "Oracular pear / this peacock / perched in a plywood roost / at the garden center...".

Says Doty, "whenever you think you know what you're doing, you are traveling a familiar path." The trick is to find the unfamiliar. His goal is to import into his poetry that which resists language. Doty was speaking about poets who have learned how to write good poetry, but who have become dissatisfied repeating things they have already done.

Doty also discussed his poem, "A Crippled King," not yet published. It is based on a three-legged stag that Doty saw frequently on Fire Island. The deer would approach close enough to get a treat. Then it suddenly disappeared. Doty later heard about a deer's head found in the water and rumors it might have been a sacrificial killing. Was this "his deer," he wondered? He began a narrative poem about the deer. Then he asked, "So what? Why should a reader care about a story that meant much to me, but might mean nothing to the reader?" He let the poem sit for a year.

Then Doty began to think about Stanley Kunitz, who said that the poet should follow the impulse to reach the mythic level in his work. Doty asked the poem "where do you want to go?" He asked the narrative to guide him out of the story and into uncharted territory. Ultimately, Doty wrote about giving his body to the deer's head, becoming like a mythological creature that is half-man, half-beast.

I admire Doty's decision to put the poem in the drawer until he could see where it

needed to go. Obviously, the mystery of the deer was important to him, but he was not sure why. It took time for the kernel of curiosity to bubble up and link the narrative to myth, and then to explore some part of himself that is both man and beast.

There are a number of current poets whose work has become predictable. Doty is not one of them. I admire his commitment to stretch and push his work into new territory and to guard against repeating himself. One method he has used is to find the words he uses most often in his poetry and banish them from new work. He discovered that the word "entirely" appears frequently in his poems. It's gone. He also found many synonyms for light. Those are going, too.

So, write what you know? Not if you follow the advice of poet Mark Doty.
