The convention contests, "The Poem Different" and "Invocation," will open on May 1st so get your words on paper soon and join me in the poetry challenge I mention below! As far as the convention goes, I have my room reserved, my registration will be sent this month, and I am excited to see you all again!

President As I write this, February is nearing its bitter end and a lot of the country is experiencing record snowfall and below normal temperatures. But rest assured! There should be no snow in Santa Fe in June! Although Santa Fe is nestled in what is referred to as the high desert at an elevation of 7,000 feet, the month of June has an average temperature of 83 degrees as a high and 50 degrees as a low. Be sure to bring a jacket for the cool evenings. It seldom rains in Santa Fe in June, with an average of 3 rainy days during the month.

Unfortunately, I have only been to Santa Fe a few times, even though it is geographically very close to Colorado. I do remember, however, the many amazing art museums, such as the Georgia O'Keeffe Museum, the brilliantly painted homes and buildings, the fine restaurants bursting with amazing flavors to delight your palate, and all the history that is Santa Fe, making it what it is. NFSPS 2019 CONVENTION CONTESTS: The Poem Different and Invocations

NMSPS invites you to enter "The Poem Different" contest. This year's theme was previously published in Strophes under the erroneous title (our bad) "Diamonds Surround the Poet in the City Different," but the actual theme for our Convention is "Diamonds Crown. . . . " So, we will accept poems that play on any of the capitalized words mentioned above (ie, Surround and Crown). Limit 40 lines, any form except prose poem. Fee is \$10 for up to three poems per entry. No limit on number of entries, but each group of 1-3 poems must be accompanied by a \$10 fee.

1st Prize - One free night at Sage Inn or \$100 cash

2nd Prize - Free Convention registration or \$75 cash

3rd Prize - Free banquet meal or \$50 cash

Invocation Poems: Nondenominational poem of thanks, appreciation, or inspiration. There will be six \$25 awards given, and winners will read their poems prior to lunch or dinner. Limit 10 lines, any form. Fee is \$5 for up to three poems per entry. No limit on number of entries, but, as above, each must be accompanied by the \$5 fee.

Winners must be present at Convention and may not win more than one prize in either contest.

Submission period for both Poem Different and Invocation contests is May 1-25 at the online submissions manager Submittable.com. Paper copies will not be accepted. Go to the Convention tab on the

NFSPS website and it will guide you to the online submission page.

If you do not yet have a Submittable account, it is free, easy to set up, and yours forever. Remember, if you entered any of this year's 50 NFSPS Annual Contests online, you may already have an account. You can both submit your poems and pay the entry fee electronically using a credit card or PayPal. CONVENTION SPEAKERS

Meet the Keynote: Valerie Martínez is a poet, educator, arts administrator, and collaborative artist. Her books of poetry include Luminescent Absence, (1999), World to World



(2004), And They Called It Horizon (2010), the limited-edition chapbooks This is How it Began (2010) and A Hundred Little Mouths (2015), as well as the book-length poem, Each and Her (2010), which won the Arizona Book Award and was nominated for the Pulitzer Prize, the National Book Critics Circle Award, the PEN Open Book Award, the William Carlos William Award, and the Ron Ridenhour Prize. Her work has been published widely in journals, magazines, anthologies, and media outlets including The Best American Poetry, the Washington Post, and the Poetry Foundation's "Poetry Everywhere" series.

Martínez also translated the work of the Uruguayan poet Delmira Agustini (1886-1914) which was published as the collection, A Flock of Scarlet Doves (2005). She was the Poet Laureate of Santa Fe, New Mexico, from 2008 to 2010. Martínez has more than 20 years of experience as a college/ university professor and has spent over 10 years in the non-profit sector, working with children, young adults, adults, teachers, and seniors in a wide range of arts and community development projects. She is currently the Director of History and Literary Arts at the National Hispanic Cultural Center in Albuquerque.

Martínez will be flying in from Chicago just in time to join us at the reception and book signings prior to the gala banquet on Wednesday evening. She hopes to do some readings at the reception, in addition to giving her Keynote address at the banquet, which will give us insights into how poetry can/does address complex issues of our time, such as tumultuous cultural and climate change, news and fake news, and a wide range of global crises.

through 95. She publishes frequently in regional and national literary journals. Her work has appeared in the Santa Fe Literary Review, Broomweed Journal, Poetica, Sin Fronteras and other magazines and books of note, including numerous anthologies. Her first full length collection, Portraits in Poetry (Village Books Press, OK, 2006), as well as her chapbook, FreeForm, are out of print. Her 2013 chapbook, Awe in the Muddle, and collection, In Everything Birds (Village Books Press, OK, 2006), are available through artqueen58@aol.com and the usual online book purchasing sites. As well as being active in the poetry community, editing, writing, and reviewing, coordinating readings, and judging art shows and recitations, Debbi works for a small scientific research and development company. She has lived in Santa Fe with her husband since 1992.

Nathan Brown is an author, songwriter, and



award-winning poet living in Wimberley, Texas. He holds a Ph.D. in English and Journalism from the University of Oklahoma

where he taught for seventeen years. He served as Poet Laureate for the State of Oklahoma in 2013-14, and now travels fulltime: performing readings and concerts; teaching workshops; and speaking on creativity, poetry, songwriting, and creative writing. Nathan has published roughly 19 books. Most recent are An Honest Day's Confession; Apocalypse Soon: The Mostly Unedited Poems of Ezra E. Lipschitz; and Don't Try, a collection of co-written poems with Austin Music Hall of Fame songwriter, Jon Dee Graham. Karma Crisis: New and Selected Poems was a finalist for the Paterson Poetry Prize and the Oklahoma Book Award. His earlier book, Two Tables Over, won the 2009 Oklahoma Book Award. taught memoir, songwriting, performance, and creativity workshops from Tuscany to the Sisters Folk Festival in Oregon, the Taos Poetry Festival, the Woody Guthrie Festival, Laity Lodge, the Farmstead Foundation Everwood Wisconsin, as well as for Blue Rock Artist Ranch near Austin, Texas. Naomi Shihab Nye said about Nathan's book, My Salvaged Heart, "Brave new world! The sizzle of couplings and uncouplings - attraction and romance, ineffable magnetism, mysterious as ever - but doused with a savory dose of Nathan Brown humor, a tilted long-ranging

eye that sees the next bend in the road even when he's standing right here, firmly planted."

City of Albuquerque Poet Laureate Emeritus (2016-18) **Manuel González** began his career in poetry slam and has represented

Albuquerque four times as a member of the Albuquerque Poetry Slam team. After working in



Albuquerque's poetry community for six years, Manuel began to use slam poetry to help local youth find positive and constructive ways to deal with life's pressures. He began teaching workshops on self-expression through poetry in high schools and youth detention centers, and he also facilitated art therapy programs to help at-risk and incarcerated youth. In 2014, Manuel started Low Writing at El Chante, a free, bimonthly writers' group open to all members of the community. In 2016, he was selected as Albuquerque's third poet laureate and has continued his passion of helping others heal and express themselves through poetry. Manuel has appeared twice on the PBS show, ¡COLORES!, where he did a program called My Word is my Power. His poetry collection, ...but my friends call me Burque, was published in 2014 by Swimming with Elephants Press.

David Meischen has been writing poetry



and teaching the writing of poetry for 35 years. A Pushcart honoree, with a personal essay in *Pushcart Prize XLII*, Meischen is co-

founder and Managing Editor at Dos Gatos Press, publisher of *Wingbeats* and *Wingbeats II*, collections of poetry writing exercises contributed by teaching poets from all over the United States. Meischen has recent work in *Borderlands, Bosque, The Gettysburg Review, Manzano Mountain Review, The Ocotillo Review, San Pedro River Review, Southern Poetry Review, Talking Writing, and elsewhere. He lives in Albuquerque with his husband—also his copublisher and co-editor—Scott Wiggerman.*

Mike Moutoux is a cowboy-singer-

songwriter-poet from Silver City, New Mexico. Also known as "New Mexico's Enchanting Cowboy," he specializes in turning ranch



work into cowboy songs and cowboy poetry that give listeners a rare look into the life of a working cowboy. "I've helped to pull calves that could not be delivered normally and watched them take their first breath; lain on the ground in the mud and blood doctoring cows; been chased by cows,

kicked by cows, fallen off a horse or two, and just generally collected too many fond memories to remember." Mike's poetry is always lyrical—perhaps because he is also a songwriter. His songs and poems are always filled with wonderful images—perhaps influenced by his work as a photographer. But it is his work as a cowboy that lends an authenticity to his work most audiences quickly realize and appreciate. What does this mean for you? Wild rides, cattle drives, and a chance to look closely at life, love, and some mighty fine country through a cowboy's eyes.

Jules Nyquist is the founder of Jules' Poetry Playhouse in Placitas, NM, where she creates a space for poetry and play with day



and weekend retreats. She took her MFA in Writing and Literature from Bennington College, VT. Her latest book of poems, *Homesick, Then*, won the NM/AZ Book Award for poetry. She has been interviewed by *NM Entertainment Magazine, Minnesota Reads* and other publications. She also publishes other poets with Jules' Poetry Playhouse Publications and has edited several poetry anthologies. Her website is julesnyquist.com.



Sylvia Ramos Cruz writes poems eclectic in form and content, inspired by works of art in all its forms, women's

lives, and everyday injustices. Many reflect the places that have shaped her life—Puerto Rico, New York, New Mexico. Her ongoing project—writing haibun about her journeys to visit road markers commemorating historic NM women—combines three of her passions: poetry, feminism, and driving the open road. Her work has appeared in Persimmon Tree, Malpais Review, Small Canyons Haiku Anthology, Encore: Prize Poems 2017, and the Journal of Latina Critical Feminism, among others. Her poetic essay, "Trilogy: Thoughts on Price, Value, Worth," won First Prize in the NM Press Women and the National Federation of Press Women 2018 Communications contests. She is a retired general surgeon, amateur photographer, avid gardener, and fully engaged women's rights activist.

Barbara Rockman is author of *Sting and Nest*, winner of the New Mexico-Arizona Book Award and the National Press Women Book Prize. Her new collection, *to*



Her new collection, to cleave, is forthcoming this summer from University of New Mexico Press. Barbara has received the

New Mexico Discovery Award, Southwest Writers Prize, Baskerville Poetry Award, The MacGuffin Poet Hunt Prize, and Pushcart Prize and Best of the Net nominations. Her poems appear in Bellingham Review, Southern Humanities Review, Taos Journal of Art and Literature, Louisville Review, and Nimrod Journal. Barbara teaches at Santa Fe Community College, leads writing workshops in various locales, and brings poetry to Esperanza Shelter for Battered Families. She received her MFA in Writing from Vermont College of Fine Arts and lives in Santa Fe.

John Roche lives in Placitas, NM, helping



Jules Nyquist run Jules' Poetry Playhouse. He taught Literature and Creative Writing for many years at Rochester Institute of

Technology, Michigan State University, and Emory University, among other schools. John and Jules recently completed the five-volume *Poets Speak* anthology series. John's own poetry collections include *On Conesus*, *Topicalities, Road Ghosts*, and *The Joe Poems: The Continuing Saga of Joe the Poet*.

Stewart Warren, author of about 25 poetry

collections, was born in Tulsa, Oklahoma, in 1950. He hit the road early, engaging in a life of troublemaking and creative expression. His poetry is both



personal and transpersonal with a mystic undercurrent. His heart-wise images evoke secret fire and cosmic yearning, while suggesting pathways perpendicular to the slave trade matrix of world society. As a publishing coach, catalyst and community organizer, Stewart helps others realize their creative visions. He owns Mercury HeartLink (heartlink.com), a small press in New Mexico.

CONVENTION FELLOWSHIPS

Again this year, NFSPS is offering several fellowships to help make it affordable for active members of affiliated state societies to attend the convention. The amounts of the fellowships are \$500 for those living over 300 miles from the 2019 convention site in Santa Fe, \$300 for those living closer.

State society members who wish to attend the 2019 convention and would appreciate financial assistance are encouraged to apply. All members, except 2018 fellowship recipients, are eligible in 2019. The application form is on the NFSPS website nfsps.com as the link: "2019 NFSPS Convention Attendance Fellowship Application". The deadline for submitting an application is April 30.

The application process is a change from the past three years, when fellowship recipients were nominated by state society presidents. This year, fellowship seekers are asked to apply directly. Of course, state society presidents are welcome to apply for themselves.

The Convention Attendance Fellowship Committee (Eleanor Berry, Diane Glancy and Lucille Morgan Wilson) will try to notify fellowship recipients by May 15.

CONVENTION TOURS

El Rancho de las Golondrinas

This living museum will give visitors a glimpse of the early history of New Mexico's Spanish cultural heritage. It has a working, water-powered mill, an early church and many original buildings on the 400+ acre site. Cost is \$15, which doesn't include lunch (can be purchased at the site).

Allan Houser Sculpture Gardens and Madrid Excursion

We will start with a private tour of the Allan Houser Sculpture Gardens, then head to the city of Madrid for lunch (not included in the cost) and a visit to the Mine Museum. Cost is \$35.

For each space, the Bookstore will supply a 5" by 7" easelmounted card on which you can publicize your work and/or list additional products you have for sale/trade. You may display your own promotional material if it fits in your allotted space.

Please place a 3" by 5" index card with author's name, book title, and price in every book or affixed to any CD offered for sale.

The most efficient way to get your books/CDs into the Bookstore quickly (i.e., before others grab the good spots) is to *fill* out the form on the convention website and email it prior to the convention. You can

also email the following info to Bookstore@nmpoetry.com: author's name, mailing address, email address, telephone number, plus titles and prices of up to ten books. Please enter "Bookstore2019" in the subject line of the email. Or, you take your chances when you arrive at the convention, waiting in line as the Bookstore Staff retypes your handwritten information into our Bookstore files. Whichever way you decide to go, also hand the Bookstore staff a legal-size, self-addressed, stamped envelope (SASE) when you bring your books.

The Bookstore will be accepting cash, check, and credit cards. We will do our best to mail checks to the sellers by mid-July. The Bookstore will begin receiving books on Sunday afternoon, June 23; you must pick up your books by 1:30 pm on Wednesday, June 26.

SHARON MARTIN TURNER GAVE DEVOTED SERVICE TO PST AND NFSPS

By Eleanor Berry, Past NFSPS President I was very sad to learn of the death of Sharon Martin Turner, who served for the past decade as Contest Sponsors and Brochure Chairperson for NFSPS. Even as her health failed, she remained committed to finding sponsors for all fifty of our annual contests.

It was no surprise to me to learn, from the notice of her death in the Poetry Society of Texas Bulletin, that Sharon had received PST's Hilton Ross Greer Service Award in 2017. Her volunteer work for her state society included serving as a Councilor, co-chairing two summer conferences, chairing the Life Member Fund, and sponsoring and judging several annual contests. I remember meeting Sharon and her sister, Valerie Martin Bailey, over breakfast at one of the first NFSPS conventions I attended. As a newcomer to the national gatherings, I was grateful for their warm friendliness.

I last saw Sharon at the 2017 NFSPS convention in Fort Worth where she and Valerie had driven from their homes in San Antonio. I was delighted to see them both again after several years when they'd been unable to make the long trips required to get to more distant convention sites. I didn't suspect that six months later, Sharon would be in the intensive care unit, fighting for her life against pulmonary hypertension and COPD.

From her obituary in the *San Antonio Express News*, I learned that Sharon was a teacher of theater arts and that she designed and built award-winning floats for the San Antonio Fiesta. I wish I'd had a chance to see her creativity in those areas, but I'm glad to have known her at least a little through NFSPS and poetry.
